#### Water Around The World

This is the 5th year for this "Water Around The World" Project in Common with NVON and many of the member states have taken on other projects and have removed this project from their active list. Several states still trickle in donations starting with May donation month. There may be other donations in November.

In May, Indiana, South Carolina and Wisconsin made donations of \$830.84. In February, Lylene Scholz and Marcelline Protheroe (former NVON officers) traveled to Nicaragua and witnessed the dire need for water filters. Fortunately, there was enough money after May to send 50 filters to Nicaragua with a shipment through Wisconsin/

Nicaragua Partners. Amy Wiza, its Executive Director coordinated the efforts and will make sure the filters get to the needed village. The filters missed the first shipment but were sent with the next shipment.

At the 2017 NVON Annual Conference in Raleigh, NC, attendees wanted to make donations toward this project so clear vases were placed on the tables at the Banquet and \$370.00 was collected. Indiana, North Carolina and Wisconsin presented Pat Breznay, WATW Chair with checks worth \$2807.49 toward this project as well. The donations will be placed in the WATW Fund and when another area is in dire need, water filters will be shipped.

Since July 2012 when this project was introduced, these most generous organizations have raised over \$121,200 toward supplying 2,067 water filters to needed families in villages helping them get clean drinking water one filter at a time around the world.

#### Eat Local, Eat Healthy

The 2016-18 NVON Project in Common, Eat Local, Eat Healthy and SCFCL's State Project emphasizes the local foods movement. Food now travels an average of 1500 miles before ending up on our plates. This globalization of our food supply has serious consequences for the environment, our health, our communities and our taste buds. The local foods movement

is a collaborative effort to build more locally based, self-reliant food economies. In 2007, locavore was the American Oxford Dictionary Word of the Year. Do you know what it means? A locavore eats food that is produced within 100 miles of their home, whether from farmer's markets, community-supported agriculture or grow your own.

At the turn of the 20th century, most of the food that we ate came from within 50 miles of where we were eating it. But as the American demographic shifted from rural to urban, many local food sources disappeared. Aided by improvements in distribution from interstate highways and overnight shipping, we started looking farther and farther away from home for our food. Or, rather, we weren't looking at all. We'd walk into supermarkets or restaurants and choose from the bounty of products that the big trucks had dumped at our doorstep. Consumer choices about food spending and diet are likely to be influenced by the accessibility and affordability of food retailers—travel time to shopping, availability of healthy foods, and food prices. The return of locally sourced produce is a recent phenomenon.

Eat Local, Eat Healthy encourages everyone to work closely with the foods movement at their respective Extension Service. There are many ways to participate:

local farmers markets community supported agriculture

food coops school gardens

or grow your own.
