

The Kershaw County FCL Clubs were happy to add three new members within the last year! Members have been using their green thumbs to help with the United Ways' community gardens in Kershaw County. Five are located at local churches and recreation centers. Juicy ripe plums and plum jam were donated to 15 local families by the Parker Club.

In February, Parker Club members held a baby shower for the resident families of New Day on Mill, a transitional housing facility for previously homeless residents (Picture on right.) They crocheted "Worry Worms" as a fundraiser to support their local charity efforts like "Sacks of Love," a program that offers summer lunches to school children in need. Members keep the "Worms" in stock at the counter of the local extension office. Next, the Parker Club will make holiday wreaths to sell for their Fall charity.

The Mt. Pisgah Club built Mason Bee houses for their monthly lesson, Let's Keep Our Bees Buzzing. Pisgah members also collected items for a local family whose home burned. Both clubs are happy to see each other again, now meeting in person monthly.

(Pictured top right) Our members generously donated \$450 cash, \$50 McDonald's Gift Cards, \$40 Wendy's Gift Cards, 2 Bars of Dove Soap, 2 Pairs of Girl's Socks, 4 Girls' T-Shirts, 3 Containers of Baby Wipes (72 each pkg), 1 Zipper Pouch, 1 pkg Fruit Snacks (10 pouches), 1 strip (5 pkg) Cheese Dip & Bread Sticks, 1 Box Goldfish Crackers (20 packs), 2 Frito Lay Snacks (18 packs in each box) 2 Boxes Fruit Snacks (6 packs in each box), 1 Box Sweet Cookies (10 packs) 4 Story Books, 1 Fashion Sketch Pad With stickers, 29 Coloring Books, 2 Word Search Books, 1 Giant Coloring Pad, 4 Journals, Box Crayons (8) 5 Boxes Crayons (24 each) 4 Jumbo Crayons (8 each), 24 Boxes Crayons (8 each box), 4 Boxes Colored Pencils (12 each box), 2 Large Crochet Bears, 1 Small Crochet Unicorn, 1 Crochet Elephant, and 1 Crochet Lamb.

Our Ways and Means Chairman, Judee Shelley, coordinated a successful 2022 pecan sale. We sold a



number of pecans sufficient to net a profit of approximately \$600 which will be allocated to help support Lexington County Family and Community Leaders' goals. 2022-2024 State Project "BEE-Cause Pollinators Feed the World" Project in Common with NVON

Donate \$1.00 (One dollar) per person to Heifer International to support BEE populations everywhere

As you know, SCFCL is among the 9 states that are members of National Volunteer Outreach Network (NVON). The Project in Common for 3 years is Bee-Cause Pollinators Feed the World. SCFCL has shared the same project with one year remaining (2024). Heifer International supports this project and has matched NVON's donations toward Honeybee gift packages. Earlier this year NVON collected \$3150 from several states for this project and Heifer International was able to provide 210 Honeybee packages internationally.

NVON has asked each state to make a \$1.00 per person donation toward this worthwhile project. Your Heifer International honeybee gift donation includes a bee package, hive, box, and training in beekeeping techniques. When you buy bees for a family in need, the gift:

- Increases the global honeybee population to support the environment.
- Boost income through sales of honey, wax, and pollen for families in need.
- Stimulate growth of the family's crops through pollination.
- Healthy beehives can double fruit and vegetable yields of small farms.

I would like for every member of SCFCL to make a \$1.00 donation to this project. 

SUGGESTED BYLAW CHANGE during the 2023 Annual Meeting

Current Bylaw:

ARTICLE XI - FINANCES

Section 2. Annual dues shall be \$4.00 per member. Dues shall cover all county financial obligations to the state association from January 1 to December 31. ACWW Rural Women in Action Fund and Nickels for South Carolina Youth shall be voluntary contributions in addition to dues.

Suggested Change:

ARTICLE XI - FINANCES

Section 2. Annual dues shall be \$6.00 per member. Dues shall cover all county financial obligations to the state association from January 1 to December 31. ACWW Rural Women in Action Fund and Nickels for South Carolina Youth shall be voluntary contributions in addition to dues.

Explanation:

SCFCL dues are \$4. The \$4 covers the cost of printing and mailing of the two News and Views and none of our other financial obligations. Voluntary donations for Nickels for South Carolina Youth, have not been enough to pay for the two \$1000 4-H scholarships, and we have been having to take the difference out of our savings. Increasing the dues to \$6 would allow us to have about \$1000 more each year that could help defray the cost of dipping into our savings to meet our financial obligations.
